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The Problematic Nature of *Philia* in the *Samia*: A Comparative Study of Aristotle and Menander

Demeas, a wealthy Athenian citizen.

Moschion, the adopted son of Demeas.

Niceratus, a friend of Demeas and father of Plangon.

Chrysis, Demeas' hetaira from Samos.

1. Ar. NE 1155b31-4¹

τῷ δὲ φίλῳ φασὶ δεῖν βούλεσθαι τἀγαθὰ ἐκείνου ἔνεκα. τοὺς δὲ βουλομένους οὕτω τἀγαθὰ εὔνους λέγουσιν, ἂν μὴ ταὐτὸ καὶ παρ' ἐκείνου γίνηται εὔνοιαν γὰρ ἐν ἀντιπεπονθόσι φιλίαν εἶναι.

Whereas we are told that we ought to wish our friend well <u>for his own sake</u>. But persons who wish another good for his own sake, if the feeling is not reciprocated, are merely said to feel goodwill for him: <u>only when mutual is such goodwill termed friendship</u>.

2. Men. Samia, 5-9

Mo: [.....]ο τοῦτο ἐσόμενον λογίζομαι,/ μᾶλλον] δὲ τοῦτ' ἂν εὐλόγως ὑμῖν ποεῖν [.....] τὸν ἐκείνου διεξελθὼν τρόπον./ οἶς μὲ]ν ἐτρύφησα τῶι τότ' εὐθέως χρόνωι ἂν παι]δίον, μεμνημένος σαφῶς ἐῶ·/ εὐεργέ]τει γὰρ ταῦτά μ' οὐ φρονοῦντά πω.

Mo: I reckon that this will be..., but to do this more reasonably, <u>having gone through his character in detail</u>. I will let it be, although I clearly remember it, how I lived luxuriously the time immediately following that, when I was a child. <u>He showed me these kindnesses</u>, <u>not yet having full knowledge</u>.

3. Men. *Samia*, 14-18

Mo: τῶν φίλων/ τοῖς δεομένοις τὰ μέτρι' ἐπαρκεῖν ἐδυνάμην./ δι' ἐκεῖνον ἦν ἄνθρωπος. **Mo**: I was able to help my friends to a reasonable extent with their needs. Through him I was a human being.

4. Men. Samia, 18-19

Μο: ἀστείαν δ' ὅμως/ τούτων χάριν τιν' ἀπεδίδουν· ἦν κόσμιος.

Mo: But I gave him some fine return: I was well-behaved.

5. Men. Samia, 343-47

Δη: οὐδενὶ τρόπωι γὰρ πιθανὸν εἶναί μοι δοκεῖ/ τὸν εἰς ἄπαντας κόσμιον καὶ σώφρονα τοὺς ἀλλοτρίους εἰς ἐμὲ τοιοῦτον γεγονέναι,/ οὐδ' εἰ δεκάκις ποητός ἐστι, μὴ γόνωι/ ἐμὸς ὑός· οὐ γὰρ τοῦτο, τὸν τρόπον δ' ὁρῶ.

De: In no way do I think it is plausible that he who was <u>well-behaved and self-controlled</u> towards all outsiders would do such to me, not even if he is ten times adopted, not my son by birth. For I do not look at that, <u>but I look at his character.</u>

6. Men. Samia, 350-52

Δη: ἐπιλαθοῦ τοῦ πόθου, <u>πέπαυσ' ἐρῶν</u>,/ καὶ <u>τἀτύχημα</u> μὲν τὸ γεγονὸς <u>κρύφθ'</u> ὅσον ἔνεστι διὰ τὸν ὑόν...

De: Forget your yearning, <u>desist from your passion [for her]</u>, and conceal, as much as possible, <u>the mistake</u>, it is necessary that you do this for the sake of your son.

7. Men. Samia, 517-518

Δη: __Νικήρατε,/ ἔκβαλ', ἱκετεύω· συναδικοῦ γνησίως ώς ἂν φίλος.

De: Niceratus, throw her out, I beseech you; sincerely <u>take offence as would a friend</u>.

8. Men. *Samia*, 623-629

Μο: εἰ μὲν καλῶς οὖν εἶχε τὰ περὶ τὴν κόρην/ καὶ μὴ τοσαῦτ' ἦν ἐμποδών, ὅρκος, πόθος, χρόνος, συνήθει', οἷς ἐδουλούμην ἐγώ,/ οὐκ ἂν παρόντα γ' αὖτις ἠιτιάσατο αὐτόν με τοιοῦτ' οὐδέν, ἀλλ' ἀποφθαρεὶς/ ἐκ τῆς πόλεως ἂν ἐκποδὼν εἰς Βάκτρα ποι ἢ Καρίαν διέτριβον αἰχμάζων ἐκεῖ·

Mo: If the matters concerning the girl were to go well, and there were not so many hindrances, my oath, my longing, the long familiarity, to which I am enslaved, indeed he would never again lay such a charge against me to my face. Having ran out from the city,

out of his way, to somewhere in Baktria or Karia, I would be living the life of a spearman there.

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
