

Hesiod's Tripod Rededicated: A Reinterpretation of *WD* 650-662

1. Hesiod's Tripod Dedication, *WD* 648-662 (trans. G. Most 2018)

δείξω δή τοι μέτρα πολυφλοίσβοιο θαλάσσης,  
οὔτέ τι ναυτιλίης σεσοφισμένος οὔτέ τι νηῶν.  
οὐ γάρ πώ ποτε νηί [γ'] ἐπέπλων εύρεα πόντον, 650  
εἰ μὴ ἐξ Εὐβοιαν ἐξ Αὐλίδος, ή ποτ' Άχαιοι  
μείναντες χειμῶνα πολὺν σὸν λαὸν ἄγειραν  
Ἐλλάδος ἐξ ιερῆς Τροίην ἐξ καλλιγύναικα.  
ἐνθα δ' ἔγὼν ἐπ' ἀεθλα δαῦφρονος Ἀμφιδάμαντος  
Χαλκίδα [τ'] εἰςεπέρησα· τὰ δὲ προπεφραδμένα πολλὰ 655  
ἀθλ' ἔθεσαν παιδες μεγαλήτορος· ἐνθά μέ φημι  
ὕμνῳ νικήσαντα φέρειν τρίποδ' ὠτώεντα.  
τὸν μὲν ἔγὼ Μούσῃσ' Ἐλικωνιάδεσσ' ἀνέθηκα  
ἐνθα με τὸ πρῶτον λιγυρῆς ἐπέβησαν ἀοιδῆς.  
τόσσον τοι νηῶν γε πεπείρημαι πολυγόμφων· 660  
ἀλλὰ καὶ ὡς ἐρέω Ζηνὸς νόον αἴγιόχοι·  
Μοῦσαι γάρ μ' ἐδίδαξαν ἀθέσφατον ὕμνον ἀείδειν.<sup>1</sup>

- a. I shall show you the measures of the much-roaring sea, I who have no expertise at all in either seafaring or boats.
- b. For never yet did I sail the broad sea in a boat, except to Euboea from Aulis, where once the Achaeans, waiting through the winter, gathered together a great host to sail from holy Greece to Troy with its beautiful women.
- c. There I myself crossed over into Chalcis for the games of valorous Amphidamas—that greathearted man’s sons had announced and established many prizes—and there, I declare, I gained victory with a hymn, and carried off a tripod with handles.
- d. This I dedicated to the Heliconian Muses, where they first set me upon the path of clear-sounding song.
- e. This is as much experience of many-bolted ships as I have acquired; yet even so I shall speak forth the mind of aegis-holding Zeus, for the Muses taught me to sing an inconceivable hymn.

2. Mantiklos Apollo, *CEG* 326 (trans. N. Papalexandrou 2005)

Μάντικλός μ' ἀνέθεκε ρεκαβόλοι ἀργυροτόξσοι  
τᾶς {δ}εκάτας· τὺ δέ, Φοῖβε, δίδοι χαρίφετταν  
ἀμοιβ[άν].

Mantiklos dedicated me to the far-shooter with  
the silver bow as a tithe; you, Phoibos, give  
back in return a graceful recompense.

3. Hesiod's Description of Ascra, *WD* 639-640 (trans. G. Most 2018)

νάσσατο δ' ἄγχ' Ἐλικῶνος ὄιζυρῃ ἐνὶ κώμῃ,  
Ἄσκρη, χεῖμα κακῇ, θέρει ἀργαλέῃ, οὐδέ ποτ' ἐσθλῇ.

And he [Hesiod's father] settled near Helicon  
in a wretched village, Ascra, evil in winter,  
distressful in summer, not ever fine.

4. Epigram, *Certamen* §13, ll. 213-214 (trans. P. Bassino 2019)

Ἡσίοδος Μούσαις Ἐλικωνίσι τόνδ' ἀνέθηκεν  
ὑμνῷ νικήσας ἐν Χαλκίδι θεῖον Ὄμηρον.<sup>2</sup>

Hesiod dedicated this to the Heliconian Muses  
when he defeated divine Homer with a hymn  
at Chalcis.
