

The CPL At Work

The Committee for the Promotion of Latin is one of the many ways CAMWS reaches out to its members. One of its special projects during the past year was an hour-long videotape, written and hosted by Norma Goldman of Wayne State University, instructing students in the art of making Roman costumes. THE CLASSICAL ASSOCIATION OF THE MIDDLE WEST AND SOUTH COLLEGE AWARDS

Application FormDeadline: December 15, 1993

There will be up to seven (7) \$500 awards and memberships in CAMWS for the 1994-95 college year.

Any junior or senior taking his/her final year in high-school Latin in the 1993-94 school year from a secondary school in the 31 states and 3 provinces of CAMWS, whose teacher is a member of CAMWS (membership information can be found in this newsletter), and who will continue to work in Greek and Latin for at least one year at any college or university, is eligible to compete for the awards.

There will be one examination consisting of a passage of Latin prose and one of poetry, both for translation at sight. The examination is intended primarily for students who have had three or four years of Latin, but superior second-year Latin students may also enter the competition.

The examination must be administered by a school official other than the Latin teacher during the week of January 31, 1993-February 4, 1993.

NATIONAL GREEK EXAMINATION

The National Greek Examination will sponsor its 17th annual examination on March 7-12, 1994. The examinations in the NGE battery comprise Attic Greek (Levels 1-3); Iliad (Level 1); Odyssey (Level 1); and Modern Greek (Levels 1 and 2). The examinations may be taken by high school students or college students enrolled in elementary or intermediate Greek. The examinations will be administered in the students' own high school or college/university by a disinterested examiner. The cost is \$3.00 per students.

There are many opportunities for classicists to visit the lands we study. Here are but a few.

- The University of Georgia will once again offer Summer Studies Abroad in Rome and Excavations at Carthage. Participants in the Rome program spend approximately seven weeks in the city, with numerous field trips and an excursion to Pompeii and the Bay of Naples. Participants in the Carthage program work for approximately six weeks on-site in Tunisia. Graduate and undergraduate credits may be awarded and all college students are eligible as are teachers seeking certification credits. MELLON POSTDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS 1994-1995

These are awarded to highly promising scholar-teachers in the Humanities (Classics is specifically listed) and are non-faculty, one-year

positions which carry department affiliation and limited teaching duties as well as the opportunity for scholarly work and intellectual growth. The PhD must be in hand by

September, 1994 and preferably received within the last seven years. The award carries an annual stipend of \$32,000 and may be renewed for a second year. U.S. citizenship is not required.

Three letters of reference and application papers for 1994-95 are due as early as possible and no later than November 15, 1993. This is a firm deadline. New fellows will be notified in early March, 1994.

The American Classical League's Committee on Educational Computer Applications has released its 1993 Software Directory for the Classics. Previously titled A Survey of Latin Instructional Software for the Microcomputer, the booklet has been updated every two years since 1985 and now includes instructional software for Greek, etymology, and Classical Civilization, as well as authoring systems, multilingual wordprocessors, font software, and multimedia materials on CD-ROM and laserdisc.

Its 95 pages provide brief descriptive reviews of most items and contact information for all software listed. There are also summary checklists of basic program characteristics and costs. The directory, compiled and written by committee chair Rob Latuousek, is distributed by the ACL Teaching Materials and Resource Center, Miami University, Oxford, OH 45056, tel. 513-529-7441, FAX 513-529-7742.
