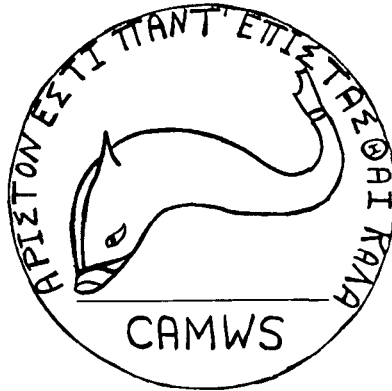

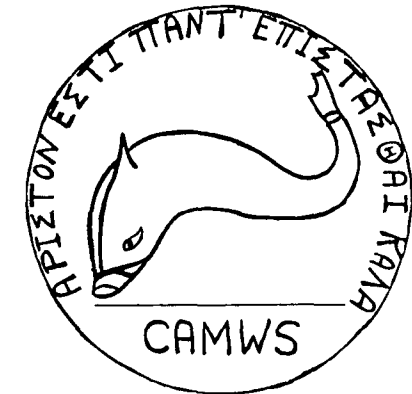
The Iowa House provides free parking in the Iowa Memorial Union Ramp, and a free shuttle service, funded by the Division for Continuing Education, will provide transportation from the Colosseum to the Iowa Memorial Union and back.

To facilitate planning, please indicate on the registration form whether you expect to attend the Annual Subscription Banquet on Friday Night. Payment for banquet tickets and accommodations is due upon arrival. Registration for accommodations is conducted via the pre-registration forms.

Iowa City is served through Cedar Rapids by Ozark and United Airlines, and limousine service is available to and from the Cedar Rapids Airport for approximately \$5.00 each way.

The Art Museum, accessible by footbridge over the Iowa River, is within a short walking distance from the Iowa Memorial Union, and so is the recently restored Old State Capitol Building located on the Pentacrest. 11 miles east of Iowa City is the Herbert Hoover Presidential Library and Museum, and 18 miles west of Iowa City are the famous *Amnara Colonies*.
