## PREFACE

Latin Word Lists contains the words most often met in the first four years of Latin study. The Latin words here listed are those recommended by the College Entrance Examination Board. An attempt has been made in this book to assign only the essential or most common English meanings to each of the words in these lists.

Time spent in memorizing the meanings of these words pays a student rich dividends in the task of translating from Latin to English, for possession of a good stock of Latin words with their English meanings allows him to save time which otherwise he would have spent consulting the general vocabulary at the back of his reading book. This is an irksome and time-consuming task and may well cause student discouragement and genuine dislike of Latin. Furthermore, on sight translation or comprehension tests, where a vocabulary is not available, a student often meets roadblocks in the shape of key words the meaning of which he does not know. This situation may prevent him from understanding what a Latin author is trying to say.

The important thing for every student is acquisition of a sufficient number of Latin word meanings to enable him to arrive quickly and accurately at the correct meaning of a sentence or of an entire passage. Lack of such knowledge slows and dulls interest in the study of Latin.

## LATIN WORD FORMATION

### PRIMITIVES, DERIVATIVES, AND COMPOUNDS

A *primitive* word may be defined as the simplest or earliest form of a word in the Latin language from which other words have been formed by derivation or by composition.

*Derivatives* are formed from the stems of nouns, adjectives, verbs, or adverbs by the addition of prefixes and suffixes.

*Compounds* are formed by adding together two or more stems or words.

### ROOTS, STEMS, PREFIXES, AND SUFFIXES

A *root* is the simplest form to which a word can be reduced. It is generally a monosyllable, and contains the fundamental idea of the word.

A *stem* is that part of a word to which the terminations of inflection are attached.

A *prefix* is a syllable placed at the beginning of a word, and a *suffix* is a syllable attached to the end of a word to modify its meaning.
