### **1:30-2:30 PM - Keynote Workshop (Swallow 008)**

“Using Active Latin in Your Classroom: A Workshop”

Tom Keeline, Asst. Professor of Classics, Washington University - St. Louis

**Description:** *After a short introduction discussing why teachers might want to use active Latin in their classrooms, I will demonstrate several specific techniques that they can use: (1) an introductory exercise to learn students' names that can be done on the first day of class; (2) a TPR exercise; (3) a reading exercise building on a short text found in an introductory textbook. Participants will be encouraged (but not absolutely required) to participate actively!*
